Then there was an amazing celebration of loons at an event called Loonapalooza in the summer. Bus tours and a 5k Walk for the Wild in the fall. All year, we've kept in touch and spread the word via our new monthly newsletter and through our website and Facebook page. We shared the Seney story with our state and federal public officials. We invite you to explore the stories inside to learn more about the impact of your support this year.

The beginning of 2024 has us in a state of hopeful anticipation, awaiting the completion of the new visitor center/headquarters. Though we miss the old, familiar visitor center, its exhibits, and the nature store, the new facility is going to be absolutely awesome! The nature store, which is operated by the Friends of SNWR, has been a significant source of revenue for Friends for decades. We are so grateful that our members and donors have stepped up to fill that funding gap while the nature store is closed. Because of your generosity, we've supported over \$100,000 in exhibit enhancements for the new visitor center in the last two years. We know you'll love the new and improved nature store when the new visitor center opens.

Looking ahead to 2024 and beyond, with your help, we will continue to support the refuge in ways that protect and preserve habitat and wildlife and connect people to the resources of the refuge. We'll continue to offer opportunities to bring our members together to celebrate and help the refuge meet the needs of the future. We look forward to partnering with you for another great year.

State of the Refuge

The refuge was a busy place this year. The Marshland Wildlife Drive reopened in May after being closed the previous season for major improvements to visitors' great enjoyment. The official groundbreaking for our new facility was May 10, and the site at Refuge Entrance Road has been a hive of activity since then. Crews have spent most of their time this year preparing the site for the new building, laying underground utilities, and completing improvements to existing buildings. Due to our UP winters, most activity has been suspended, and will gear up again as soon as the weather permits in the spring.

Visitor Services staff spent many hours working with the project's design firm to finalize the visitor center exhibit space. The exhibits will focus on the diverse habitats on the refuge and the variety of species that thrive in them. One of the many exciting exhibits is a pool habitat that will be

embedded below floor level in the main exhibit space. A clear surface covering the exhibit will enable visitors to get a glimpse into the fascinating life below the surface of the pools on the refuge.

Refuge staff also completed working with Argentine Productions on a new welcome video. "Discovering Seney" will orient visitors to the wonders of the refuge when they arrive at the visitor center.

In addition to the main campus construction activity, we added a new outhouse and changed the parking lot layout at the Showpool Shelter site. A breach in the dike that had closed the Showpool Connector Trail was repaired and the trail was restored. Work also began to decommission the Delta Creek water control structure.

Besides managing the projects being funded by the Great American Outdoors Act, refuge



staff hosted several school tours, a Bioblitz event, the annual Photo Contest, a new storybook trail at Northern Hardwoods, and volunteer events with the help of Friends.

Financial Highlights

Total expenditures this year were \$50,498. Refuge support will enhance habitat exhibits at the new visitor center, supplementing our \$75,000 gift in 2022. Community events expenses supported our 2023 outreach efforts. We received \$1.80 in revenue for every dollar spent on community outreach events. Member communications, including development of a new website, comprised over 50% of administrative costs.





Together, we raised \$73,035 in 2023. Donations and dues accounted for 69% of revenue. Income from events and other sources contributed 31%, demonstrating the success of our diverse fundraising initiatives.





Liabilities include \$17,700 in restitution funds held for protection of the Kirtland Warbler Wildlife Management Area.

Community Outreach

Engaging the community in the stewardship of Seney National Wildlife Refuge is one of our most important goals. That means joining together with people who love the wildness of the refuge and who want to preserve and nurture it into the future. In 2023,

Earth Day Celebration led by Seney NWR staff




25 citizen scientists "bioblitzed" the refuge, photographing refuge species and uploading their discoveries to a national database for research use.


Membership Update

Advocacy



The Friends of Seney participated in the National Wildlife Refuge and Coalition of Refuge Friends and Advocates-sponsored Expo on Capitol Hill in November. The annual event offers members of Congress the opportunity to learn more about the value of our nation's wildlife refuges. Friends members contacted state and federal public officials with messages about the importance of supporting refuges and invitations to our events. We received good news that the Congressional Wildlife Refuge Caucus has recently been reconstituted, a bipartisan group that has historically played a vital role in preserving the national wildlife refuge system.

Connecting with Members

We've worked extra hard this year to stay connected with our members. In addition to the many fun face-to-face events Friends hosted this year, we stayed in touch by distributing our monthly newsletter, *The Trumpeter*, to over 350 email addresses and mailboxes. Our
